PRESIDENT - EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S COLUMN

On the 1st of January 2003 a new President and a new Executive Director assumed leadership of a venerable association in transition. In this year of the 50th North American meetings of the Regional Science Association/Regional Science Association International, RSAI must confront issues of efficiency and economy in the delivery of membership services, the need for review of arrangements for the publication and distribution of Papers in Regional Science, the need to reconsider the structure of the Association's governance and the roles of its officers, and the extent to which the Association is accessible to all who would wish to be members. We take this opportunity to assure you that we are moving forcefully as a team to address these issues and work towards satisfactory solutions.

As reported in the previous issue of the RSAI News, the headquarters offices in Urbana will close in January 2005. Arrangements for delivery of membership services by a commercial firm must be in place prior to this time. Proposals of arrangements that link service delivery with publication and distribution of Papers in Regional Science and RSAI News (in alternative media) and terms have been solicited from several firms and are being considered by the working committee on transitional matters appointed at the November 2002 RSAI Council meeting in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Members of this committee, which comprises ourselves, the current President and Executive Director, the immediate past Executive Director, Kieran Donaghy, Editor-in-Chief of Papers in Regional Science, Raymond Florax, and the heads of the Association's three super-regional conference organizing associations, Adrian Esparza, Andres Rodriguez-Pose, and Yoshiro Higano, have met in Puerto Rico and London and will bring forth a recommendation to the Council for a vote at its next meeting in Acapulco. At this meeting the committee will also present for consideration an organizational transition plan to be discussed in

Acapulco and Jyväskylä and voted on in Philadelphia. The proposed transition plan will be posted on the RSAI web site (www.regionalscience.org) for review by all members of the Association. We will meet personally with officers of all RSAI sections to solicit and consider their input on these matters.

The last decade has seen a broadening of the geographical base of RSAI, with new sections forming in Brazil, Mexico, Indonesia, and South Africa, important meetings being held in China, and a revitalization of sections in Central and Eastern Europe. With this broadening have come stresses upon the superregional alignment of the Association and the structure of its governance. There has also developed a growing sense that the role and composition of the RSAI Council and the roles of the Association's officers need to be reconsidered and revised. As members of the RSAI Council find it increasingly difficult to attend all three of the Council's annual meetings, it may make sense to hold fewer Council meetings but create working groups that meet more frequently. And as the RSAI headquarters in Urbana is phased out and membership service delivery is taken over by a private firm, it seems reasonable that the focus of the Executive Director should turn more to the development of the Association and implementation of policy in close collaboration with the President. The working committee on transitional matters will make recommendations on such changes, which would have to be approved by the Council and reflected in amendments to the RSAI constitution.

The issue that stands out above all others is that of how to increase RSAI membership. On the basis of RSAI databases, we estimate that there are over 10,000 regional scientists worldwide.

Submission Information: All materials for submission should be transmitted in electronic format, either via email, email attachment, or disk. Files may be submitted in Word, WordPerfect, rich text or ASCII formats. If your file contains special characters (e.g. international characters) please also submit a printed copy, either by postal mail or fax. Materials received only in printed format are not guaranteed for publication. Material for inclusion in RSAI NEWS should be received by the editors no later than December 1 for the January issue, April 1 for the May issue, or July 1 for the August issue.

For a number of reasons, including cost prohibitiveness, the majority of such people have been reluctant or unable to join the Association, or if they have done so in the past, have lapsed as members. The Association must, as a matter of great urgency, develop ways of ensuring that all members, both full international and section-only, are regarded as members of RSAI and receive at least some services from the Association. Easier payment systems for a more finely broken-out continuum of services are needed, with greater emphasis placed upon value-for-money. The role of sections, many of which have been essential for collection of membership fees and communication with the RSAI headquarters, needs to be reviewed. Such changes are of vital importance as the Association moves to embrace heretofore excluded parts of the developing world.

A relaunching of RSAI will commence with the Association's 50th North American meetings in Philadelphia this November 2003 (see below for details) and continued at the World Congress in Port Elizabeth, South Africa, in April, 2004. All who attend the Philadelphia meeting will receive the expanded golden anniversary issue of Papers in Regional Science, a CD-ROM containing the back volumes of the journal, and a history of regional science and RSA/RSAI written by Walter Isard with assistance from David Boyce. We urge you to join us in celebrating 50 years of Regional Science and helping to make RSAI a vital international scholarly society that is easy to join and easy to stay a member of. We look forward to working with you and receiving your comments.

RSAI MOURNS LOWELL ASHBY

Lowell DeWitt Ashby, 89, one of the Southern Regional Science Association's founding fathers, a Fellow of the organization, and a pioneer in shift-share analysis, passed away March 3rd at Virginia Hospital Center in Arlington, VA.

Lowell was born in Hastings, Nebraska, and graduated from Hastings College. He received a master's degree in economics from the University of Minnesota and a doctorate in economics from the University of Wisconsin. He joined the staff at the Commerce Department in 1962. From 1948 to 1962, he served on the economics faculty at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Lowell was very active in SRSA; even much after his retirement, he still came to as many annual meetings as his schedule permitted.

Survivors include his wife of 61 years, Fern E. Ashby of Arlington; two children, Genette Ashby-Beach of Atlanta and L. DeWitt Ashby Jr. of Vienna; and three grandchildren.



NOMINATIONS FOR ALONSO PRIZE

Nominations are now being sought for the William Alonso Prize for Innovative Work in Regional Science. The award was established in memory of Bill Alonso, whose brilliant innovations shaped several fields. It is awarded periodically for innovative academic work on understanding of human or organizational activity or behavior in space, recently published in a refereed journal or comparable publication. The first award was made last year to Masahisa Fujita and Paul Krugman for their contributions to developing the "New Economic Geography". Nominations should include a short statement of reasons for the nomination and a complete citation for the nominated work. An electronic or hard copy of the work would also be appreciated. Eligibility is open to any work published in the English language in the recent past. Unpublished Ph.D. dissertations are not eligible.

Nominations will be judged on the basis of innovativeness, likely impact on the development of academic studies in the respective field, and completeness of the work, in the sense that meaningful conclusions are derived. The selection will be made by the Prize Committee, which comprises Michael Teitz, PPIC (Committee Chair), Roger Bolton, Williams College, Sir Peter Hall, University of London, Andrew Isserman, University of Illinois, Kyung-Hwan Kim, Sogang University, Koichi Mera, University of Southern California, and Karen Polenske, Massachusetts Insitute of Technology. The deadline for nominations for the Alonso Prize this year will be May 15th, 2003. The award is announced at the annual RSAI meeting in November.

NEW NSF PROGRAM ON HUMAN AND SOCIAL DYNAMICS

The National Science Foundation has issued a program announcement for a new priority area titled "Human and Social Dynamics." This program announcement can be found at: http://www.nsf.gov/pubs/2003/nsf03552/nsf03552.htm.

This special competition will inaugurate the Human and Social Dynamics (HSD) priority area. This priority area aims to develop and apply multi-scaled, multi-disciplinary approaches to better understand the causes and ramifications of change and to increase collective capabilities to anticipate its complex consequences. A related goal is to improve the understanding of the dynamics of behavior and the human mind. HSD also aims to advance knowledge of the cognitive and social structures that create and define change and to help people and organizations better manage profound or rapid change. In this initial year of a multi-year effort, the following topical areas will be emphasized: (A) Decision Making Under Uncertainty (DMUU), a part of the President's Climate Change Research Initiative; (B) Enhancing Human Performance (EHP); and (C) Empirical Implications of Theoretical Models (EITM).

RECENT BOOKS BY MEMBERS OF RSAI

William R. Black and Peter Nijkamp (eds.), *Social Change and Sustainable Transport*, Indiana University Press, Bloomington, Indiana, 416 pages, index, ISBN 0-253-34067-5, \$69.95.

This book presents papers from a conference on Social Change and Sustainable Transport that was held at the University of California at Berkeley in March 1999 under the auspices of the European Science Foundation and the National Science Foundation.

The contributors are from a range of disciplines, including geography and regional science, economics, political science,

sociology and psychology, and from twelve different countries. Subjects covered include the consequences of environmentally sustainable transportation vs. the "business-as-usual" status quo; the new phenomenon of "edge cities," automobile dependence as a social problem, the influence of leisure or discretionary travel and of company cars; the problems of freight transport; the future of railroads in Europe; the imposition of electronic road tolls; potential transport benefits of ecommerce; and the electric car.

Transportation research has traditionally been dominated by engineering and logistics research approaches. This book aims to integrate social, economic, and behavioral sciences into the transportation field. As its title indicates, emphasis is on socioeconomic changes, which are increasingly what governs the development of the transportation sector.
